Jerrica Lilley, PharmD (2023-2025)






Sophie Rooks, PharmD (2024-2026)

A message from the Dean



Graduates of the FSOP Residency Program,

Another school year has come to a close. I wanted to update you on some exciting things that have happened this year at the Feik School of Pharmacy.

We graduated 73 students this year, which continues to grow our population of pharmacists. As of now, 33% of all pharmacists in Bexar County are FSOP graduates. Soon, we will have the majority of pharmacists in the county. The Class of 2023 did very well on their Boards with an 86% passing rate. This put us number 2 in the state and in the top 20% for the nation. We are wishing for the same success for the Class of 2024 on their Boards. We will not know the results until December.

Most of our graduates found employment before graduating, and we have a 99% employment rate for our graduates who chose to practice pharmacy. Some of the Class of 2024 decided to go on to do residencies. We had our highest match rate with 85% of those seeking residencies getting them.

We are very proud of our success at getting reaccredited. The PharmD program got the maximum eight years of reaccreditation. The Pharmacy Continuing Education program received the maximum of six years, and the Pharmacy Technician program received its first accreditation.

We have been doing very good at fundraising. Along with the multiple gifts from alumni, Stonegate Pharmacy pledged \$235,000 to remodel our sterile compounding laboratory. CVS has given us \$60,000 to continue our pipeline program to admit students from the Rio Grande Valley.

Please feel free to contact me at any time with comments or questions about the school. I think we are on an upward trajectory and are looking forward to having 80 new students in August. I wish you a wonderful summer that is hopefully not too hot.
