Dr. Jerrica Lilley, PharmD (2023-2025)


Post residency job: Decentralized clinical pharmacist at Hendrick Medical Center – Abilene, TX





A message from the Dean



Graduates of the FSOP Residency Program,

We are very proud of you for working in your chosen field. I hope that you are finding your career to be exciting and your training is making it a smooth transition. Even though you are not graduates of the PharmD program, and some of you are, you are still alumni of the Feik School of Pharmacy. We want to hear from you. We also hope to be able to catch up if you can visit the school or at a meeting. It is so rewarding for us to brag about your accomplishments. We hope that you will take the opportunity to give back by precepting our students and residents.

I am proud to announce that the Class of 2024 had a 77% pass rate on the NAPLEX. This was a reduction in our usual passing rate but still puts us at the 50th percentile nationally. We have our fingers crossed that the Class of 2025 will bring our scores back up to maintain our standing as one of the best pharmacy schools in Texas and the nation.

We will start the year with 90 P1 students in the Fall. This is the largest entering class in five years. Hopefully, our recruitment goals will let us hit our goal of 100 students next year. With the pharmacist shortage, most of the Class of 2024 had job offers upon graduation.

Our P4 students did great with residency acceptances. We had 79% acceptance rate. We are very proud of them. I want to thank the Residency Acceptance Committee, mentors and the residency elective for helping candidates achieve a successful match. I also want to thank Drs. Kitten, Williams and the RAC for all the work that they do to make our residency program a success.

Finally, we had a great celebration in February with the Ribbon Cutting Ceremony for the remodeling of the Dispensing Lab. We were able to remodel the lab, get four new hoods and a touchless sink. All of this was possible with a generous \$235,000 donation from Stonegate Pharmacy. We renamed the Dispensing Lab to the Stonegate Pharmacy Sterile Compound Laboratory in recognition of this generous donation.
